

Introduction to:

Developing a Board Training Strategy

The purpose of this presentation is to help the board of directors of a Community Action Agency (CAA), as well as individuals and organizations supporting the board, design a plan for providing training and orientation to the CAA's board members regarding their roles and responsibilities. Many CAAs and organizations that support them understand the need to implement a comprehensive and systematic approach to educating board members—whether it be the initial orientation for new directors, or ongoing training for the board—but lack the capacity to develop a strategy for delivering high-quality board training. This presentation aims to help boards take a step back and consider the basic building blocks of good board training—the Why? Who? Where? When? How? and What? of board training.

We envision that a variety of individuals or organizations could use this presentation to work with the CAA board to develop a strategic and systematic approach to board training. These could include the governance committee of a CAA's tripartite board, state community action associations, executive directors, the staff liaison to the board, and/or outside board consultants. Additionally, state community action associations can adapt this presentation to develop state-level board training strategies working with their network of local CAAs and other stakeholders such as their State CSBG Lead Agency. State Associations could hold facilitated discussions at their board meetings or during conferences to plan an annual board training strategy.

The training does not include substantive information about training topics but rather is aimed at helping a board determine the topics and best methods for conveying information about them. Some regional and or state training and technical assistance (T/TA) associations that support local CAAs have developed CAA-specific resources that may be incorporated into a board training strategy. For example, the Illinois Association of Community Action Agencies offers a complete series of <u>Board Training videos</u>.

Additionally, a number of organizations provide substantive resources around a board's roles and responsibilities generally and may be useful to those developing training programs. Some of the organizations we regularly consult include:
